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# 00 | Introduction

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## 1. Stats and Facts

Adventist young people are leaving the church at alarming rates.

In an effort to reverse this trend, the Center for Youth Evangelism, headquartered at the Andrews University Seminary, in Berrien Springs, Michigan, (CYE) has launched a ministry support initiative called **Church of Refuge (COR).** The purpose of COR is to help churches deliver effective young adult ministry, and to assist young adults in finding churches that are prepared to support their spiritual growth.

What follows are stats and facts on youth dropout.

In the research, anyone who held all of those beliefs was said to have a biblical worldview.

- (i) To qualify as "post-Christian," individuals had to meet 60% or more of the following factors (nine or more). "Highly post-Christian" individuals meet 80% or more of the factors (12 or more of these 15 criteria).
  - a. Do not believe in God
  - b. Identify as atheist or agnostic
  - c. Disagree that faith is important in their lives
  - d. Have not prayed to God (in the last year)
  - e. Have never made a commitment to Jesus
  - f. Disagree the Bible is accurate
  - g. Have not donated money to a church (in the last year)



- h. Have not attended a Christian church (in the last year)
- i. Agree that Jesus committed sins
- Do not feel a responsibility to "share their faith"
- k. Have not read the Bible (in the last week)
- I. Have not volunteered at church (in the last week)
- m. Have not attended Sunday school (in the last week)
- n. Have not attended religious small group (in the last week)
- o. Do not participate in a house church (in the last year)

## 2. Life Stories - You Lost Me

These are two excerpts of two emails written by Charlotte.¹ She is in her early-30s. She has been a missionary on 2 different continents, has taught Cradle Roll at her current church, and been on church committees. She is a life-long SDA who received an SDA education. She is a fun, out-going person, not a fruit-nut who can't get along with people. She has spent time working for Habitat for Humanity and is passionate about service. Her discontent has grown over 3 years of involvement at her present church, which is not in a remote location.

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I have even gone to church [at the Methodist church] on Sundays. It is AWESOME. They are so kind and the message speaks to me. IT is a church that GIVES so much to the community through programs and outreach.

I struggle. What does it mean to be adventist? If I keep the sabbath because I believe it is the day of god but worship on Sunday what does that mean? God said to keep the sabbath holy not go to church.

I am leaving because it hurts me to be a part of a church that I feel is dead and NO ONE is listening. I need church. I need fellowship and to share with others that love Jesus. I love to be a part of a group....

I love being SDA I love all the people I have met even the weird ones.

I am not disbelieving in my church I do believe we have something special and of course totally believe in the sabbath. It isn't about the truth and it isn't even about being hurt by the church because that isn't it. The struggle is will God understand if I become a Methodist? Isn't that weird? Will he forgive me for not being able to find a place in the SDA community here? For wanting a place my family can grow in and love Jesus and see what he means beyond the Sabbath?

I feel like I tried really hard at my church and only found resistance every step of the way and I can't understand why???

I guess what I want to say is that I am positive. I wasn't a stick in the mud at my church I did my best to serve.

## 3. What is COR?

Church of Refuge (COR) exists to plant, build, launch, and network churches that will not only welcome but empower youth and young adults for spiritual leadership.

COR focuses on meeting young adults' spiritual, social and community impact needs through **Nine COR Values**. These nine values are supported by biblical teaching, pastoral experience, the writings of Ellen G. White and original research conducted by the Center for Youth Evangelism. A **COR congregation** is a local church that can demonstrate the Nine COR Values in action.

The Nine COR Values are:

- 1. Sabbath
- 2. Discipleship
- 3. Acceptance
- 4. Community
- 5. Support
- 6. Service
- 7. Leadership
- 8. Budget
- 9. Change

# 4. Why COR?

Where does the concept of Church of Refuge come from?

If we go to Deuteronomy 19:1-7, we discover the concept of cities of refuge.

As Israel shifted its focus from the wilderness to the promised land of Canaan, Moses established a system for justice by calling for three **cities of refuge** (Deuteronomy 19:1-2). Individuals who had accidentally killed another person could escape vengeful family members by seeking shelter, security, and community in one of these cities (19:4-6).

**Easy access** to a city of refuge was of paramount importance (19:6). Consequently, Moses made three key provisions regarding access. First, he ordered that roads be built to these cities (19:3a) so those on the run would have an easier journey.

Second, the locations of the three cities were strategically placed by dividing the land into three regions (19:3b). This ensured that no one would have to travel a great distance to find rest and security.

Third, in Deuteronomy 19:8, Moses made plans for increasing the number of cities of refuge from three to six to match the expanding territory given by God. Because the existence of safe cities was so important, provision had to be made for future adaptations so the population would continue to have access to the desired benefits. The cities of refuge must be where the people were, not simply where tradition had originally placed them.

One significant benefit to using cities belonging to the priests was that these societal refugees could receive training from the religious leaders. "Hence, the place of refuge could become... a source of real blessing to the slayer as the priests and Levites taught him the way of Jehovah" (Nichol, 1976, p. 278).

Following this tradition, churches of refuge are inclusive, accepting, community-oriented, strategically placed, safe, spiritual environments for young adults. They are faith communities that accept people for who they are, where they are. That is, friendship and acceptance are not given or withheld due to personal history, appearance, current belief system or other factors. Also, members know they will not be disrespected or excluded because of mistakes, questions or doubts. In these communities designed to meet their needs, young adults can seek God and grow in Him.

Furthermore, COR congregations are safe places for members to experiment with innovative spiritual expressions and community outreach. Some projects will succeed, while others will not; however, creativity continues to be fostered and appreciated. COR congregations take seriously Ellen White's (1946) statement that, "God would have new and untried methods followed." (p. 125).

# 5. How to Become a COR Congregation

A **COR congregation** is a local church that can demonstrate it is following the Nine COR Values.

A church can become a part of the COR network by doing the following:

- 2. Set up a <u>COR Summit</u> for your church by contacting <u>cor@cye.org</u> or call (269) 471-8380.
- 3. Seek elders, board and business session vote to become a COR congregation.
- 4. Once you have formally voted to becoming a COR Congregation, you will be assigned a COR coach who will offer you ways to incorporate the 9 COR Values into your congregation DNA.
- 5. After you are certified, you'll need to provide a short online yearly report on how you are actively incorporating the 9 COR Values into your ministry mix.

## E. Extended Description of Value

COR congregations provide a meaningful Sabbath experience for senior youth and young adults by offering time and space for collective study, worship and socializing. Young leaders actively shape the activities and meetings for this age group.

#### F. COMPONENTS

- A **space** is available for young adults to meet at a desired time on the Sabbath (Friday night, Saturday morning/afternoon).
- A second service is available if the main service does not meet the needs of this group.
- **Greeters** at church are friendly and reach out to visitors.
- **Visitors** are recognized, welcomed and invited to return.
- **Retention** is analyzed from database numbers.
- Conversational Bible study groups are informative and practical.
- **Music** is worshipful and desirable for local young adults.
- Preaching is engaging, biblical, relevant, grace-filled, Christ-centered and actionoriented.
- Alternate vespers, Sabbath Schools, Sabbath afternoon activities and worship services are developed as desired.

## Excerpt from Chapter Twelve: Meaningful Conversation

"If we are going to create space for meaningful conversation as part of our church experience, preaching may have to be the catalyst. It is, after all, the one place in our worship where people have every right to expect some engagement with the question "What does this mean?" There is a reasonable hope on the part of worshippers that a sermon should serve to draw meaning out of the scriptural texts and other elements of the liturgy in a way that is comprehensible and relevant to their lives. If preaching is meaningful in this sense, it only seems reasonable that meaningful preaching should be the catalyst for meaningful conversations.

"Good preachers know this. They preach in ways that are engaging, telling stories and contextualizing so as to draw a response from their listeners. But rarely is there the opportunity for that response to be put into words. By the time the listener has the chance to utter any words in response, those words are often reduced to "Good sermon, Reverend." The problem with performative preaching is that even, or perhaps especially, when it is done well, the take-away can be simply the feeling of having witnessed a good performance. Without personal engagement, the story the preacher tells on Sunday soon becomes overwhelmed by the many competing stories of our lives. The hour we spend at church on Sunday becomes disconnected from the other 167 hours of our week.

"So if we need a place to have meaningful conversations, and if preaching can serve as a catalyst for those conversations, what would happen if we created space during or after the sermon for worshippers to speak and to interact, if not with the preacher, then with the people sitting around them?

"We follow the lectionary, which meant that the next Sunday after our cross-country ski outing was "The Baptism of the Lord," and the gospel reading, appropriately enough, was the account of Jesus' own baptism, as told by Luke. It is an event rooted in time, taking place in the 15th year of the emperor Tiberius of Rome. It is an event rooted in space, taking place by the Jordan River, just north of the Dead Sea. It is the story of a particular human being, Jesus of Nazareth, born of Mary, 30 years old. It is the story of concrete actions, of being plunged into water. It is a story of the earth.

"But it is also a story of heaven. It is the story of a divine presence, which is seen and heard. When Jesus had been baptized and was praying, the heavens were opened. And the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased" (Luke 3:22).

"The story of Jesus' baptism tells of one of those places where heaven and earth touch each other — thin places, as the Celts liked to call them. But there are many thin places, places and moments where we can be deeply aware of the presence of God in our ordinary, daily lives.

"What would happen if I asked our community to talk about their thin places in response to this story? Would they be intimidated? Would they be able to articulate their own experiences of God? Would they have anything to say at all?

"It always helps if someone goes first. So I told people about one of the thin places that I still recall most vividly. I was on the corner of Division and Princess Street in Kingston, in the fall of 1981. It was my second year at Queen's University and I was riding my bike to class, as I did pretty much every morning. On that particular morning, the light was red when I got to Princess Street, and so I stopped. And in that moment, as I sat on my bike with one foot on the ground for balance, the sun seemed to turn golden, and I had a wonderful sensation of warmth, and an overwhelming feeling that God was with me. In that moment, which may have lasted a second but seemed to last much longer, I knew, I just *knew* that all was well.

"So, after a brief pause, I asked the congregation, "Where are your thin places? When were, when are the moments in your life when heaven and earth touch? Perhaps you can turn and gather in a small group with those around you and share them with each other."

"There was a moment's hesitation. Some looked at me to make sure I was serious. Then, the sound of scraping chairs and rustling in pews, and soon, steadily and surely, the hum of voices starting to build. The space came alive with meaningful conversations."

# Implementation Ideas.

- Sabbath School Class for young adults, that is led and operated by them.
- **Special Vespers.** Every third Friday the South Bend Seventh-day Adventist churches present a vespers program called "The Refuge" that is planned, prepared, and presented by young adults.
- Corporate worship and style. Try a blended worship service, where well known
  hymns and new songs are offered. Allow for creativity in the order of service as well as
  in what is presented.
- Preaching. The sermon each Sabbath is Christ centered, Bible based and visitor friendly. Occasional guest speakers provide a positive mix to the services. The consistently friendly services make them a viable place to invite friends.
   It is important to add a Sabbath focused on young adults with a guest speaker targeting this age group.
- Greeters. Add teenagers and young adults to the greeting team. Make it your goal to make sure that everyone is greeted five times before entering the sanctuary; that visitors are politely and personally directed to services; that they are greeted as they leave. Have a visitor's package ready and make major changes in how you deliberately attempt to bring first time visitors to second time visitors, and second time visitors to a special Sabbath School class. This could include: 1) changing service so that offering is after sermon so that you can have a response card for all to fill out; 2) give a good, age appropriate book, to first time visitor; 3) send a gift card to first time visitor as a "thank you" for coming. 4) Deliberately connecting with visitors who a) may have come alone (without a connection to a member), or b) may have a particular need, such as needing special prayer or a place to go for lunch. Have designated members ready to take young adults home for lunch after church.
- **Sabbath Activities.** Friday evenings could focus on prayer time, music, and testimonies, while Saturday afternoons could focus on prayer, devotion, reach out to the community, fellowship, visit non attending church members, sharing Bible studies with interested individuals and then evening social activities such as game night, bowling, and other activities enjoyed by young people.
- **Prayer for young adults.** Find prayer warriors who have a burden for young adults.

#### **PREACHING**

### ReInvention Stories from an Urban Church, excerpt from chapter Twelve:

"If we are going to create space for meaningful conversation as part of our church experience, preaching may have to be the catalyst. It is, after all, the one place in our worship where people have every right to expect some engagement with the question "What does this mean?" There is a reasonable hope on the part of worshippers that a sermon should serve to draw meaning out of the scriptural texts and other elements of the liturgy in a way that is comprehensible and relevant to their lives. If preaching is meaningful in this sense, it only seems reasonable that meaningful preaching should be the catalyst for meaningful conversations.

"Good preachers know this. They preach in ways that are engaging, telling stories and contextualizing so as to draw a response from their listeners. But rarely is there the opportunity for that response to be put into words. By the time the listener has the chance to utter any words in response, those words are often reduced to "Good sermon, Reverend." The problem with performative preaching is that even, or perhaps especially, when it is done well, the take-away can be simply the feeling of having witnessed a good performance. Without personal engagement, the story the preacher tells on Sunday soon becomes overwhelmed by the many competing stories of our lives. The hour we spend at church on Sunday becomes disconnected from the other 167 hours of our week.

"So if we need a place to have meaningful conversations, and if preaching can serve as a catalyst for those conversations, what would happen if we created space during or after the sermon for worshippers to speak and to interact, if not with the preacher, then with the people sitting around them?

"We follow the lectionary, which meant that the next Sunday after our cross-country ski outing was "The Baptism of the Lord," and the gospel reading, appropriately enough, was the account of Jesus' own baptism, as told by Luke. It is an event rooted in time, taking place in the 15th year of the emperor Tiberius of Rome. It is an event rooted in space, taking place by the Jordan River, just north of the Dead Sea. It is the story of a particular human being, Jesus of Nazareth, born of Mary, 30 years old. It is the story of concrete actions, of being plunged into water. It is a story of the earth.

"But it is also a story of heaven. It is the story of a divine presence, which is seen and heard. When Jesus had been baptized and was praying, the heavens were

opened. And the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased" (Luke 3:22).

"The story of Jesus' baptism tells of one of those places where heaven and earth touch each other — thin places, as the Celts liked to call them. But there are many thin places, places and moments where we can be deeply aware of the presence of God in our ordinary, daily lives.

"What would happen if I asked our community to talk about their thin places in response to this story? Would they be intimidated? Would they be able to articulate their own experiences of God? Would they have anything to say at all?

"It always helps if someone goes first. So I told people about one of the thin places that I still recall most vividly. I was on the corner of Division and Princess Street in Kingston, in the fall of 1981. It was my second year at Queen's University and I was riding my bike to class, as I did pretty much every morning. On that particular morning, the light was red when I got to Princess Street, and so I stopped. And in that moment, as I sat on my bike with one foot on the ground for balance, the sun seemed to turn golden, and I had a wonderful sensation of warmth, and an overwhelming feeling that God was with me. In that moment, which may have lasted a second but seemed to last much longer, I knew, I just *knew* that all was well.

"So, after a brief pause, I asked the congregation, "Where are your thin places? When were, when are the moments in your life when heaven and earth touch? Perhaps you can turn and gather in a small group with those around you and share them with each other."

"There was a moment's hesitation. Some looked at me to make sure I was serious. Then, the sound of scraping chairs and rustling in pews, and soon, steadily and surely, the hum of voices starting to build. The space came alive with meaningful conversations."

## 1. COR Value #2 Discipleship

#### A. Short description of value

COR Congregations are committed to discipleship through a personal relationship with Jesus Christ.

#### **B.** Bible Text

Therefore, **go and make disciples** of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you. And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age.

~ Matthew 28:19-20 (NLT).

#### E. Extended Description of Value

- **Small groups.** Make holistic small groups a major component of the regular church life. Have young adults take part in the initial training and lead out in the formation of new groups.
- Share a meal and form visitation teams. You could have the young adult Sabbath School class invite all the elders out to a Saturday evening dinner at a restaurant with the purpose of the elders getting acquainted with the young people, and to form teams for visitation.
- Retreats. Have spiritual retreats each year for young adults.
- Bible Study Training.
- **Mentoring Spiritual Devotions.** Mentor young people in spiritual devotions. Teach them how to build and maintain a successful and vibrant personal devotional life.



#### E. Extended Description of Value

COR congregations accept people for who they are. **We embrace all humanity** regardless of gender, ethnicity, religion, personal history, appearance, odor or any other characteristic. We worship a God of variety, and we embrace those who are dissimilar to us. We acknowledge that our role is to love and to show respect. Regarding those who are dealing with sin in their lives (all of us), while we do not approve of sin, we also do not believe sinlessness is a precondition for friendship.

#### F. COMPONENTS

- Greeters are friendly and hospitable to all.
- Members and visitors are received warmly.
- **Leaders embrace all** members rather than showing favoritism.
- Social and spiritual inclusion are quickly offered to all.

- Opinions and ideas are valued even if they are not accepted as orthodoxy.
- People of various backgrounds are valued as brothers and sisters. **Cultural diversity** is warmly **accepted and celebrated.**
- The Golden Rule is lived.
- Social networks are on-ramps to church life, not barriers to it.

## Implementation Ideas.

- Church greeters. Actively welcome and greet people when they come to church. Have greeters go through training to know how to welcome visitors and make them feel at home, no matter who they are, where they come from, or how they look. Purposefully greet visitors five times before they enter the sanctuary.
- Respect for all & Cultural diversity. As a church, make it your goal to embrace diversity and welcome variety in church life and worship.
- Inclusion of visitors and new members into church life. Invite new people to
  participate in church life and ministry. Some options for service are taking up offering or
  helping on the platform, before they become members. Social activities could be
  volleyball or ping pong on Sunday afternoons, basketball on Tuesday evenings, etc.
- **Worship**. Educate your church so different types of worship are welcome by all. Include more traditional and new songs. Focus a sermon on loving people, grace, and mercy every once in a while to communicate the vision of embracing cultural diversity and different worship expressions.
- Connecting with others. Plan and create opportunities for young people to mingle with others, while not becoming tempted to join the world. Connect an elder with each of your young adults, with the purpose of visiting non attending church members.



#### A. Short description of value

COR Congregations are committed to building a caring and friendly community.

#### **B.** Bible Text

Above all, you must **live as citizens of heaven**, conducting yourselves in a manner worthy of the Good News about Christ. Then, whether I come and see you again or only hear about you, I will know that **you are standing together with one spirit and one purpose**, fighting together for the faith, which is the Good News.

COR congregations incubate **healthy, active relationships**. A friendly atmosphere is created where people can connect. Steps are taken to ensure that visitors and new members are included in formal and informal social activities.

#### F. COMPONENTS

Meals are shared in homes and at church.

- **Contact information** for members and visitors is kept current.
- **Social events** are planned outside of church time. They may include, but are not limited to, book clubs, music groups, trips, outdoor activities, sports.
- **Newsletters** keep all informed.
- Non-active members are invited to **belong even before they believe.**
- **Cards** are sent as appropriate.
- Missing members are contacted with care and tact.
- When activities are planned, extra energy is spent to ensure **members at the margins** are included.

# Implementation Ideas.

- Potlucks. Plan fellowship meals for visitors periodically. You can also plan a larger fellowship meal for the whole church to come together.
- **Social activities.** Plan numerous activities on a regular basis, such as basketball, volleyball and ping pong to draw a crowd of young people, both church members and non members. Another idea is to run a pinewood derby circuit through the year with six races. These are excellent ways for parents and children to fellowship together. Start a book club, go paintballing, organise camping trips. Include young people in the planning process.
- **Home Invitations.** Make sure church members take interest in the young adults and invite them to their homes for Sabbath Afternoon. This is where younger generation can connect with the older generation, and friendship and understanding can blossom.



- Pastor makes referrals as necessary to supporting agencies.

- **Support groups** are available for members, where they can encourage one another emotionally and physically.
- Support in the form of health care, career advisement, financial management training and other life issues is available as far as possible.
- Members dealing with **emotional issues** (depression, suicide, self-esteem, etc.) are encouraged, not excluded.
- Members dealing with **lifestyle issues** (sex, gambling, shopping, etc.) receive support.
- Members dealing with substance issues (alcohol, smoking, drugs, etc.) find help to be free.
- Members dealing with **family issues** (marriage difficulties, divorce, death, infidelity, etc.) receive help and support.

- **Counseling.** Offer counselling options (pastoral, personal, marriange, health, etc.) to help your young adults. You may also vote a formal Boundary Policy that all staff and elders are required to follow, in order to maintain proper etiquette.
- Seminars Available. Sponsor programs such as a Depression Recovery, and Coronary Health Improvement Program every year.
- Create a Resource Directory. Create a directory of professionals who are members of your church, or neighboring SDA churches, so that you can provide service and support to your young adults. This may also serve as a directory where your members can direct business to your church members, and your young adults can develop a network with other Adventist professionals.
- Identify specific skills and interests to support young adults. You may conduct
  a survey to see which members would be impressed to take on this ministry. You may
  choose a leader to coordinate both talent information available and the process of
  connecting young adults to members that can be of support. Your data base could
  include:
  - i. Mechanics for those with car trouble
  - ii. Car salesperson for those in need of a car
  - iii. Marriage counselors for those in troubled relationships
  - iv. Financial advisors for those with financial issues
  - v. Government workers for those who may need Government assistance (i.e. food stamps, welfare, etc.)
  - vi. Medical professionals, such as Dentists, Doctors, and Physical Therapist
- Greet Young Adults. Actively watch the doors to your church with the intent of connecting with all young adults who come to the church.
- Create a Needs Assessment Team. As some young adults face special challenges
  as they begin to plant roots and establish themselves professionally, you could make it
  your goal to create a team of church members, who will work alongside your young
  adults and provide support and seek relevant assistance from church members. This

upport may range from help with mechanical repairs, to professional networking, to eeking medical or dental services.

#### **B.** Bible Text

Our people must learn to use their lives for doing good and helping anyone who has a need. Then they will not have empty lives.

Service opportunities exist at three levels – giving fish, teaching people how to fish, and advocating for all to have equal access to the pond.

#### F. COMPONENTS

- Acts of service are done in a way that respect the person served and evoke praise for our Father in heaven.
- **Partnerships** are formed with local service agencies (Habitat for Humanity, Red Cross, Amnesty International, United Way, etc.)

- Acts of service benefit and meet the needs of church members as well as the local and global community.
- Activities may include:
  - Renovating homes
  - Tutoring children
  - Responding to disasters
  - Cooking meals



COR Congregations are committed to senior youth and young adult leadership.

Stay at your post reading Scripture, giving counsel, teaching. ## Working together

Having considered some ways to meet the needs of youths, let us now consider how we can work together to see that these things are happening more consistently and intentionally in our congregations. I recommend the following strategies:

- 1. Provide at church a setting in which teens can gather to express and discuss their needs and fears. One way to do this is to providing a teen small group moderated by a caring and mature Christian adult. The small group could meet before or after services, or during the teaching part of the main service (though the better strategy is to make the main service teen friendly, and have the teen small group before or after main church).
- 2. Provide times when youths can get away together and with caring, mature Christian adults. Retreats are great. So are trips to fun places. Many churches offer weekends, summer camps and other events for youths. Take advantage of these opportunities to build closeness among your youths, and for them to bond more closely with adult sponsors and leaders.
- 3. Plug your youths—your teens in particular—into meaningful, consistent ministry within your congregation. Do not just have a youth day at church a couple of times a year when the teens do most of the worship service. Rather, give them a place in ministry week-in and week-out.

**For example,** do you have youths on your worship team? How about a drama team? Are youths frequently offering congregational prayers and helping with ushering. **Do you have a mature youth on your congregation's advisory council?** Think about how youths can be active in all the ministries of the congregation.

Lessons on strategic programming:

**Begin with your clearly defined process**--you must begin with the process not the programs

Choose one program for each phase of your process--multiple programs for each phase of the process divides attention and energy

**Design each program for a specific aspect of the process**--each program should be distinct from the others

Place the programs in sequential order (P. 140-142).



- Hold spiritual gifts seminars to assist young people in discovering and developing their gifts. Empower your young people for leadership by learning what spiritual gifts and natural abilities each has. Train them to employ those gifts in church leadership. Provide the necessary resources, skills, and support to do the job well and then step back and allow them to do it.
- Examine committees at all levels of the church to ensure that youth are represented at the decision-making committees.
- Instruct churches to develop a policy to safeguard the necessity of youth involvement in all aspects of church life.
- Support youth through mentoring and skills-building opportunities.
- Hold seminars for churches on youth involvement.

- Invite local churches to appoint mentors for youth involvement purposes. Ensure that the appointed mentors have sufficient time and energy to excite youth.
- Make sure the nominating committee will choose youth and young adults to fill real and significant roles in church life, not just "token" positions.
- Check that the finance committee will make spending on youth activities and projects a priority.
- Monitor the needs of youth and older church members.
- Examine each level of church organization to assess the current level of youth participation in that particular level.
- Instruct the church board or executive committee to clarify types of youth needed and how they will be involved in the mission of the church.
- Share decision-making power within the church.
- Provide training. Young people may need training in communication, leadership, preaching skills, and other areas. Older church members may also need training in working with youth as well as in technical areas.
- Develop an intern program for youth.
- Promote a strong volunteer program that will be an outlet for participation/involvement.

This amount should reflect the size of this group relative to the rest of the church body and may be a constant percentage of the budget or a set amount for each senior youth and young adult.

- Church budgets include funds designated for senior youth and young adult ministry.
- Senior youth and young adults are involved with the use of the budget.
- Fundraising activities are undertaken.

•	Monies are used for <b>resources, activities and projects</b> valued by senior youth and young adults.



### A. Short description of value

COR Congregations are committed to change that leads to improved senior youth and young adult ministry.

### **B.** Bible Text

Don't be like the people of this world, but **let God change the way you think**. Then you will know how to do everything that is good and pleasing to Him.

- A. 6 Myth-Debunking Truths About the Church

The Church is a Living Organism Not a Static Institution Most of the metaphors and explanations for the Kingdom of God and the church in the New Testament use natural concepts for identification and description: the body, the bride, branches, the field of wheat, the mustard seed, the family, the flock, leaven, salt, light. When the New Testament uses a building as a metaphor for the Church, it is quick to add that it is made up of living stones (1 Pet 2:5) (p. 34-35)
  - 2. The Church is So Much More Than a Building At least four times in the Bible the Scriptures come out and say plainly that God does not dwell in buildings made by human hands. . . it is important to note that the early Church did not have any buildings for the first three hundred-plus years. . . . Buildings are not wrong or immoral. It is not the buildings that are really the problem. Unfortunately, we often begin to function as though the church buildings are our life source. . . . A building can become an artificial life support system that keeps a church alive even though it died long ago (p. 37).
  - 3. The Church is Not to be Bound to A Single Location we are always asking the wrong question: Where? All along, the right question is--Who? Where you worship is nothing compared to who it is you worship (p. 39)
